At this time of year the bird ringers are getting into Constant Effort Site (CES) ringing. This is where the same nets are put up as far as possible on the same day for the same length of time. The first of the days this year fell on the Bank Holiday weekend which meant a 5.00 am start and a finish at about 4.00 pm. They love it really.

We have had quite a lot of work done around the reserve in the past weeks. The steps at the start of the Woodland Walk have been completed as have a new set which link the paths which run down towards the lake with the path which runs through the woodland at the north end of the scrape area. As well as this, most of the trees which were blown down in the January gales have been cleared and the areas tidied up. We have also had another block of scrub coppiced, this time it was the turn of the area in front of and to the west of the Field Centre. Already these areas are beginning to look better as the plants begin to regenerate.

The new birdwatching hide is proving very popular with our visitors - especially now the paths up to it have been completed. Our volunteers have done some first class work in front and beneath the hide, tidying up after the builders. If you haven't been inside I can recommend a visit.

Open Day

Preparations for the Open Day on 28 May are continuing. We had a successful meeting in April at which a lot of people volunteered to help either before the event or on the day. The key to success is publicity and we recently sent all our Friends and volunteers some material to display in their local area. Our thanks to those who have done so and particularly to those who have asked for more. We can still produce further posters and car stickers if anyone needs them.

Bird Notes

We have been looking at some of our bird ringing data and have discovered some interesting facts. The 26,450 records for Foxglove Covert on our database refer to 18,916 individual birds. Of these, 14,180 birds are ones which we have captured once and never seen again. The remaining 4736 birds are ones which we have caught more than once.

The individual record for most times captured goes to a male Robin, P105957. We first captured him as a juvenile on 12 July 2000 and, since then, we have recaptured him no less than 26 times! If we look at a chart of his captures we can see the following:

This shows us that, over the past years we have recaptured P105957 between 3 and 9 times a year. We can also see that the most popular time of year for P105957 to fly into a mist net is December - is he the original Christmas Robin? So why is P105957 so different from the majority of our birds? Well, as

anyone who has a garden will be able to testify, male Robins are notoriously territorial and are prepared to take on all comers to defend their patch. Now, if P105957's territory just happens to be close to a mist net . . .

One other interesting question is: where does P105957 go in the summer? If we look at the captures we can see that we have mainly caught him between September and March and never in August.

But what about other birds? If we look at those we have captured 20 times or more, the list will look like this:

The real surprise here is 9G9123, a Treecreeper which we captured 20 times between 18 July 2001 and 26 June 2003. That works out as 1 capture every 5 weeks!

Adopt-a-Box Scheme

Our Adopt-a-Box scheme has taken off like a rocket. We launched the scheme on 16 February when we let box number 42, now, just 11 weeks later we have let 97 boxes and raised a total of £330. We will be starting to check the boxes soon with a view to ringing and recording the chicks.

We have increased the number of boxes available very slightly. When we started the scheme we had about 133 boxes on the Reserve. This has now gone up to 151. The additional boxes are mostly woodcrete but we also added some new special boxes made of wood and Richard Francis, who suggested the scheme in the first place, has also made some more wooden ones. We used some of these to replace boxes which had become unfit for avian habitation.

We have been surprised at the number of people who wanted to sponsor our "special" boxes - those which don't have either a round hole or an open front. When we started we had 12 special boxes and, in response to demand we increased this to 23, all of which were snapped up in just a few days.

Many thanks to everyone who has sponsored a box and for those who haven't got around to it yet - we still have 54 available!


Competition Corner
